Project glossary

amphibian An animal that has moist skin and lives on land and in water.
animal A living thing that grows, breathes, eats, moves, gets rid of waste and has offspring.
antenna A long, thin body part on an invertebrate's head that is used to sense the environment.
beak The hard, pointy part of a birds' face that contains its mouth and nostrils. Some reptiles and invertebrates also have beaks.
bird An animal that has feathers, two wings, two legs and a beak.
body covering The covering of an animal, such as fur, feathers, scales, skin or a shell.
camouflage The ability to hide or blend in with the surroundings.
carnivore An animal that only eats meat.
claw A curved nail on the toe of an animal. Also known as a talon.

A body part used for hearing.



eye A body part used for seeing.
feather One of many soft, waterproof parts that cover a bird's body.
fin A flat part that sticks out of a fish's body to help it move and balance.
fish An animal that lives in water and has hard scales, gills and fins.
fur The thick hair that covers the bodies of some mammals.
gill A body part that fish and some amphibians use to breathe underwater.
group A number of things that are placed together for their shared features.
hearing The ability to hear sounds.
herbivore An animal that only eats plants.
human A mammal with two arms and two legs that walks in an upright position.
hunt To chase and try to catch or kill an animal for food.





An animal that is often small and has a soft body. Some have a hard covering or shell.
limb An arm, leg, wing or flipper of an animal.
mammal An animal that has fur or hair and four limbs.
mouth A body part used for breathing, eating, tasting and communication. Includes the lips, tongue and teeth.
nose A body part containing holes called nostrils, used for smelling.
offspring The young of a plant or animal.
omnivore An animal that eats both meat and plants.
pet An animal that humans keep at home as a companion.
reptile An animal that has dry, scaly skin and has either four legs or no legs.
scale One of many small, flat pieces that cover the skin of fish and reptiles.





sense The ability to understand the environment, such as sight, smell, touch, taste and hearing.
shell An animal's hard outer body covering that gives it protection.
sight The ability to see our surroundings.
skin A body part used for sensing touch and also acts as a protective layer.
smell The ability to smell a scent or odour.
tail A body part that sticks out from the base of an animal's back.
teeth A part of the mouth used for tearing and grinding food.
tongue A part of the mouth used for tasting and swallowing food and communication.
touch The ability to feel when coming into contact with another object.
wild animal An animal that lives outside and finds its own food, shelter and water.
wing A body part that is usually used for flying.

block graph A type of graph that uses blocks or rectangles to show different amounts. Carroll diagram A way to sort information into a table using 'yes or no' questions. instructions Information about how to do, make or use something. investigation An activity that involves a person studying a subject or problem carefully to learn facts or answer a question. An investigation includes a planning, doing, recording and reviewing stage. observe To watch or look at something carefully. record To write down information, such as numbers, words, measurements or observations in different ways, such as lists, tables, charts or labelled diagrams. research To study a subject to discover new facts or information.

A practical way of finding out about something.

Venn diagram

A diagram that shows the relationship between two groups of things by using overlapping circles.
