## Glossary

<b>amrit</b> A special liquid made from sugar and water.
<b>Five Beloved Ones</b> The first five members of the Khalsa.
<b>Five Ks</b> The five symbols of Sikhism – Kachera, Kangha, Kara, Kesh and Kirpan.
<b>gatka</b> A form of combat training.
<b>Gurdwara</b> A Sikh place of worship.
<b>Guru Gobind Singh</b> The last living Guru who created the Khalsa.
<b>identity</b> Beliefs, personality and looks that make a person who they are.
<b>Kachera</b> One of the Five Ks – cotton underwear.
<b>Kangha</b> One of the Five Ks – a wooden comb.
<b>Kara</b> One of the Five Ks – a steel braclet.
<b>Kesh</b> One of the Five Ks – uncut hair.
<b>Khalsa</b> The community of Sikhs who have taken amrit.





## Khanda

Knanda A symbol of Sikhism – a double-edged sword.
<b>Kirpan</b> One of the Five Ks – a small dagger.
<b>langar</b> A 'free kitchen' where food is served.
<b>Nagar Kirtan</b> A joyful, hymn-singing procession through the streets.
<b>Panj Pyare</b> The first five members of the Khalsa.
<b>sacrifice</b> To give something up.
<b>Sikh</b> A follower of Sikhism.
<b>symbol</b> An object or image that represents something else.

The anniversary of the creation of the Khalsa, which is also a New Year and harvest festival.
