Whole School Update




A highlight of this term was the fantastic Book Week, which was planned to coincide with World Book Day. During this time, we ran a book fair, built story






In the last few weeks, Year 6 children have been out and about in the village, completing the Bikeability programme and have just enjoyed a three-day residential

Wow! What a wonderful term

we have had in Nightingale Class! The children have amazed me with their knowledge of London and, in particular, The Great Fire of London. We have delved deep into the stages of the event and learnt what an impact it had on the city. We have used story maps to help support our writing which was fantastic. We also used the same process to write instructions on 'How to make a Tudor house', which we then constructed!

In maths, we have been working very hard to secure our knowledge of place value up to 50. The children can now confidently talk about the number of 'tens' and 'ones' in two digit numbers. After Easter, we will be counting up to 100 so plenty of counting over the holidays would be great!

In science, we have been investigating the seasons and observing the different weather as we transitioned from Winter to Spring. We measured the wind using the Beaufort scale and the hours of sunlight.

We have, of course, thoroughly enjoyed our time down in Windmill Woods. I loved hearing about how the children challenged themselves to try new activities.

A HUGE thank you for your support with reading at home—we have seen some fantastic progress in reading and phonics so, I promise, 10 minutes a day really is worthwhile!

As part of our science unit, "plant survival", Darwin had the opportunity to go to Great Dixter for their



school trip. The children made flatbreads, picked wild garlic and did some beautiful printing of flowers they liked all around the gardens. The children also went into the wooded area where they made dens, sang songs around the campfire and cooked their flatbreads! It was a fantastic day.

Darwin have worked hard on their beach huts in DT during term 4. First, the children designed their beach huts. Then, they made their beach huts and finally, the children evaluated them.

In English, the children became confident with using text maps

to retell stories. They loved reading and retelling the story of "The Lighthouse Keeper's Lunch" where they could change small details if they wanted to. The children used words such as "brazen", "scavenging" and "pesky" to describe the cheeky seagulls who kept stealing people's lunch!

Judaism was our unit in RE this term and the children really embraced their learning throughout their RE lessons. The children enjoyed learning all about the Menorah candles, the story of Hanukkah and trying traditional Jewish snacks called latkes.

With all the fun activities during Book Week, one of the highlights was making dens to read our books to Nightingale Class in.


During our design technology sessions, we have been looking at mechanisms in machines. Collaboration was key when making a trolley in pairs, and even more so when making an automaton toy with a cam.


Churchill's engineering ingenuity has also been in full force this term: the children competed in teams to design and build a range of bridge prototypes in design and technology, and burglar alarms in science.

Attendance


Attendance is at 94% at the end of this term. A little down on last term. This is mainly due to unauthorised holidays, unfortunately.
