What an incredible Term 4 Potter Class has had!




This term, we have learnt where our food comes from and that there are different types of food groups. We visited the local shop to find out about different types of food. We did some cooking and made kebabs with fruit and soup using vegetables.

During Book Week, our focus story was 'Jack and the Beanstalk' and we planted beans which we have watched grow over the last four weeks. We have also planted radish seeds and cress. We

enjoyed a visit from a parent who talked to us about how fruit grows and he gave us lots of fruit plants to grow in the school allotment.



We were very excited to welcome our 'Living Eggs' into the classroom and over two weeks we watched them hatch and grow into fluffy chicks. We were fortunate to hatch all 10 eggs and five will be returning to school when they are big and strong enough. This experience inspired lots of art and craft activities and fostered curiosity in how living things grow and change over time.



We have made fantastic progress this term with our Early Learning Goals. We have continued to work on our whole school phonics scheme, 'Read, Write Inc', and we have excelled in both our reading and writing. Some of us are even writing short sen-

tences with capital letters and full stops! In maths, we have enjoyed learning how to subitise, recall double



numbers and explore shape and capacity. In Forest School, we have started to learn how to use tools safely and we have really enjoyed exploring and playing in the stream. We have also observed the season change from Winter to Spring and have been looking for signs of Spring in our garden and in the forest.

Nightingale Class Update



Wow! What a wonderful term we have had in Nightingale Class! The children have amazed me with their knowledge of London and, in particular, The Great Fire of London. We have delved deep into the stages of the event and learnt what an impact it had on the city. We used story maps to help support our writing which was fantastic. We also used the same process to write instructions on 'How to make a Tudor house' which we made—and burnt! The re-enactment was a great way to finish off the term.

In maths, we have been working very hard to secure our knowledge of place value up to 50.

The children can now confidently talk about the number of 'tens' and 'ones' in two digit numbers. After Easter we will be counting up to 100 so plenty of counting over the holiday would be great!

In science, we have been investigating the seasons and observing the different weather as we transitioned from Winter to Spring. We measured the wind using the Beaufort scale and made our own wind socks. We loved measuring the weather every day.



We have, of course, thoroughly enjoyed our time down in Windmill Woods. I love hearing about how the children have challenged themselves to try new activities.

A HUGE thank you for your support with reading at home—we have seen some fantastic progress in reading and phonics so I promise, 10 minutes a day really is worthwhile! Happy Easter from Mrs Player, Mrs Manser and Mrs Wilding.







Darwin Class Update

Darwin have been working incredibly hard this term, resulting in some fantastic work and learning.

In maths, Darwin have enjoyed learning the inverse operation of multiplication - division - by using a variety of manipulatives to support their learning.

Darwin Class wrote fantastic descriptions for 'Book Week' based around the book, 'Journey', which actually doesn't have any words! The reason I chose this text was so we could really go to town with our imagination during our writing, and we sure did! We also looked at 'The Lighthouse Keeper's Lunch' which the children loved and wrote fantastic diary entries for.

In science, the children enjoyed learning all about plants and flowers, which linked nicely to our art unit of work, 'Flower Head'.

The children's favourite subject was geography - we have now finished all our learning about the coastline. The children really enjoyed a visit from Pam of the RNLI during a workshop where they were able to dress up, learn about the dangers of water and much more!

Pankhurst Class Update



Pankhurst Class have worked amazingly hard this term, but here are some of the highlights that the children wanted to share.

In our Design Technology lessons, we have studied how cams work and made some automaton toys with a working cam inside. The children had to work hard and persevere in their pairs and small groups to ensure the cam made the toy move.

In Gymnastics this term, we have developed our rolling, balancing and jumping skills. We challenged ourselves to make a sequence of moves that were contrasting or matching.

When investigating magnetism, we managed to make our own compasses using a needle to indicate the direction of North. Do you know what a magnetic field looks like? The children used iron filings to demonstrate the patterns a magnetic field makes.

When studying the Christian period of Lent, we enjoyed discussing the challenge of giving up something that we like or enjoy. To mark the beginning of Lent, we made vegan pancakes, which the children really enjoyed!

I have been so impressed with Pankhurst's enthusiasm for the 'Rumbles, Rocks and Relics' topic, and it has been so

relevant learning about Earthquakes when there have actually been some very large ones affecting countries around the world.

Hello from Shakespeare Class!

We have had another great term of working really hard. For the first three weeks, we continued with our English book, 'King of the Cloud Forest', and wrote diary entries as the character, Ashley. We then moved on to writing a newspaper article about a bottle-nosed whale that was stranded in the River Thames in 2006. This tied in with our topic of 'Mountains and Rivers', learning about the rivers in the UK and worldwide. We made our own 3-D models of mountains and rivers, labelling all of the main features, and did a fantastic job of adding amazing detail!

In maths, we have been becoming masters of everything to do with fractions – you name it, we can do it! We also enjoyed moving on to our new topic of decimals.

Along with all the other classes, we really enjoyed Book Week, where we used 'Alice in Wonderland' as a focus and wrote our own Wonderland adventure, imagining ourselves as Alice on an adventure in our own Wonderlands!

In DT, we have learnt all about the work of William Morris and created our own prints based on his designs – they look really impressive. For science, we have been looking at classification and learnt lots about sub-categories of invertebrates and plants.

In PE, we have continued gymnastics and developed our sequencing skills to include balancing and Rolling. We have great control in tennis and are developing a good relay volley.


Holmes Class Update



In the field, we looked at expanses of plants, learnt about



Reducing sugar - Food facts -Healthier Families - NHS

Added sugar:

When we talk about added sugar, we mean sugar that has been added to food and drink to sweeten it.

This could be added by the manufacturer, by you if you're cooking at home, or by the chef or cook if you're eating out.

It's not just the white sugar you might think of on a teaspoon either: it includes fruit juice, honey, syrups and nectars too.

You do not need to worry about sugar in: Plain milk, plain yoghurt, whole fruit and whole vegetables. This is not added sugar but remember to keep dried sticky fruit to mealtimes to protect teeth!
