Potter Class Update





This term we have started our new topic 'Magnificent Monarchs'.

We are studying plant nutrition and reproduction in science this term. The children have already learnt so much new vocabulary—can you find the carpel in a flower?

In computing, we have been exploring simulations and it is amazing to see how the children have developed their problem-solving skills during these lessons.

Finally, I wanted to mention a valuable unit of work we have been working through in maths—money. We made sure that the children had coins and notes to learn how to work out change along with adding and subtracting different amounts. This is such important 'real life' knowledge!

Shakespeare Class Update









Well, Shakespeare Class has had another very busy term of learning!

This term has found us learning all about Ancient Sumer in our topic lessons, and we enjoyed continuing with the 'ancient' theme in English. We were great poets when we wrote and performed our free verse poems about Ancient Sumerian temples. We began reading our book, 'Secrets of a Sun King', which is set in Ancient Egypt and is about a girl called Lil who has to get a canopic jar back to Egypt to set her grandad free from a curse. We've used this text to write a newspaper report about a gruesome discovery. We will be continuing with this book after half term, and we can't wait to find out what happens!

The Sumerians have been a focus in our history lessons and we've learnt a lot about ancient inventions that still help us today.

In science, our topic has been electricity and we have had fun learning about how electricity is produced and how it reaches our homes. We've been using practical resources to make electrical circuits and light a lightbulb.

We also really enjoyed learning about Eid-ul-Adha. We've linked our art to our RE lessons and learnt how geometric shapes were used in Islamic art. We then created our own repeating patterns.

We finished the term with our trip to Bedgebury and we had a fantastic time learning about making maps using landmarks. We also made journey sticks which helped us learn a lot about the trees there—one tree was 175 years old! We finished our day on the play trail and, in total, we walked nearly 5 miles!

Afterwards, the children have produced graphs and detailed evaluations to explain their results.



Attendance for this term stands at 95.8%. 15 children currently have attendance below 90%, meaning they have missed at least 10 days of school so far this year. 
